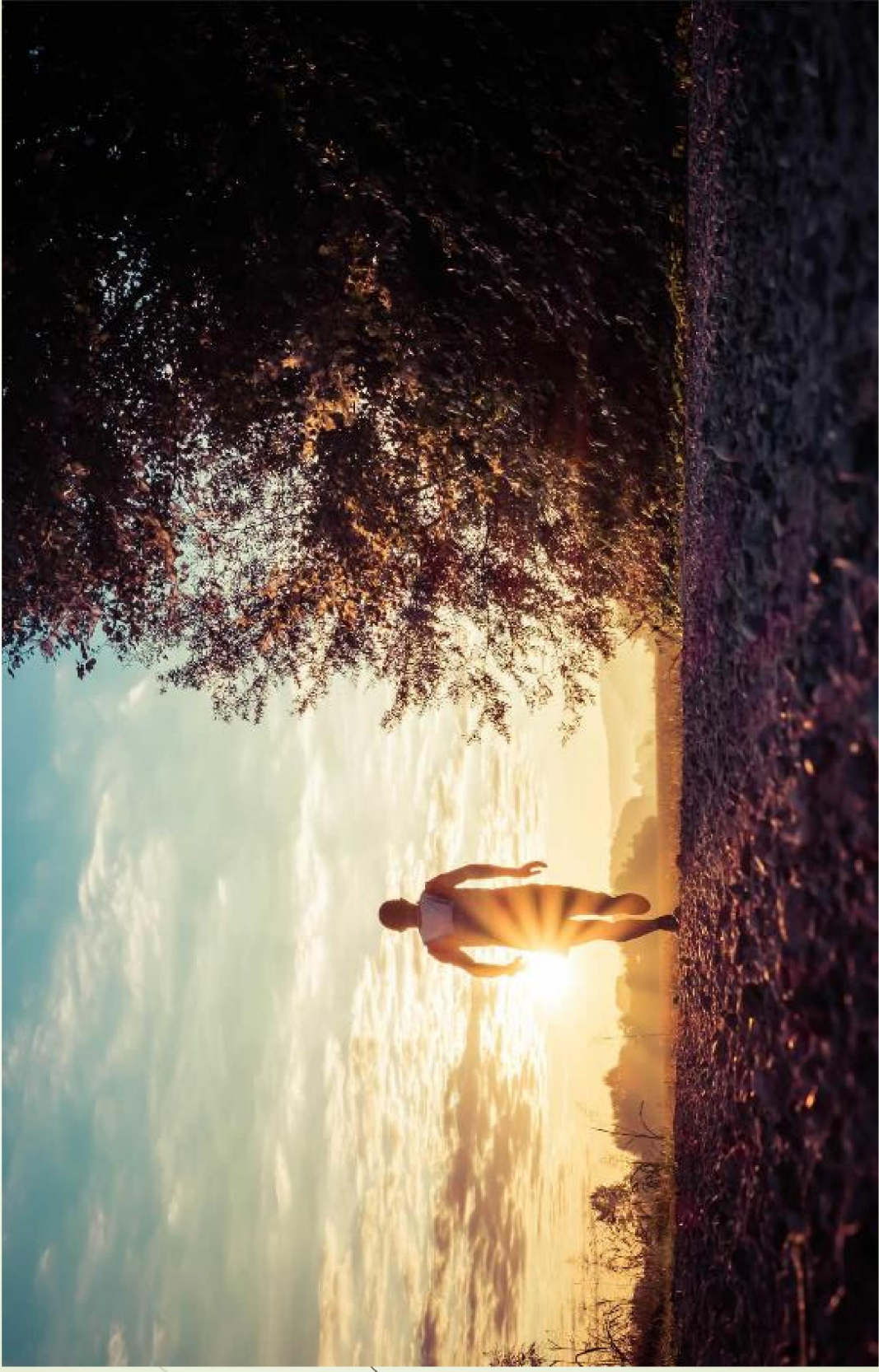

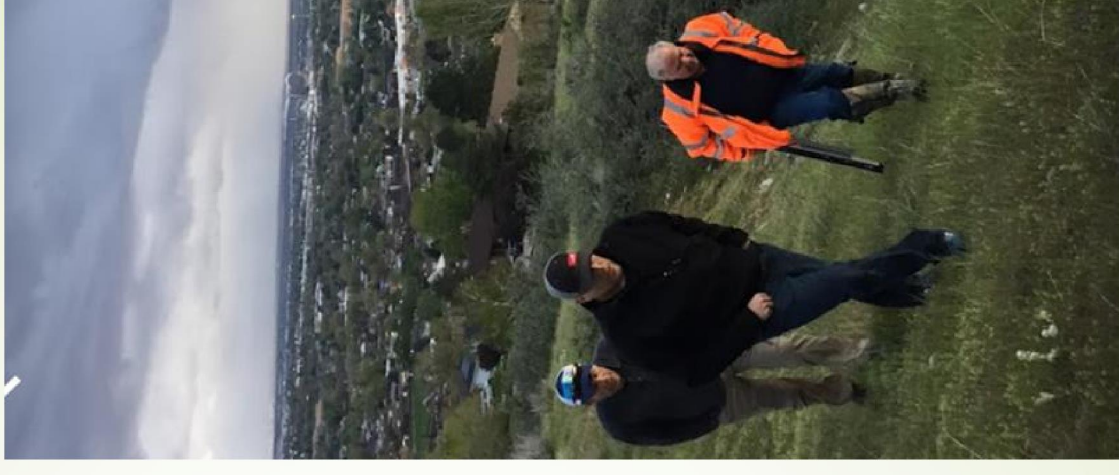
Centerville Multi-use Trails

- 160 Acres of City Owned Property



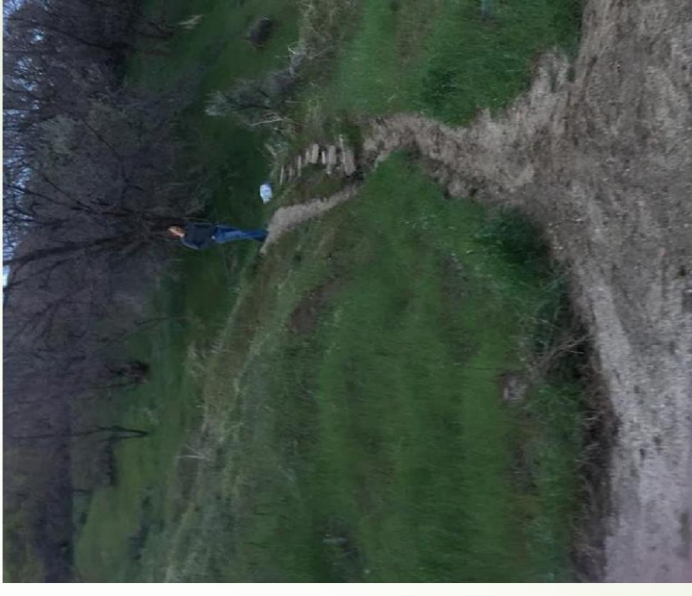

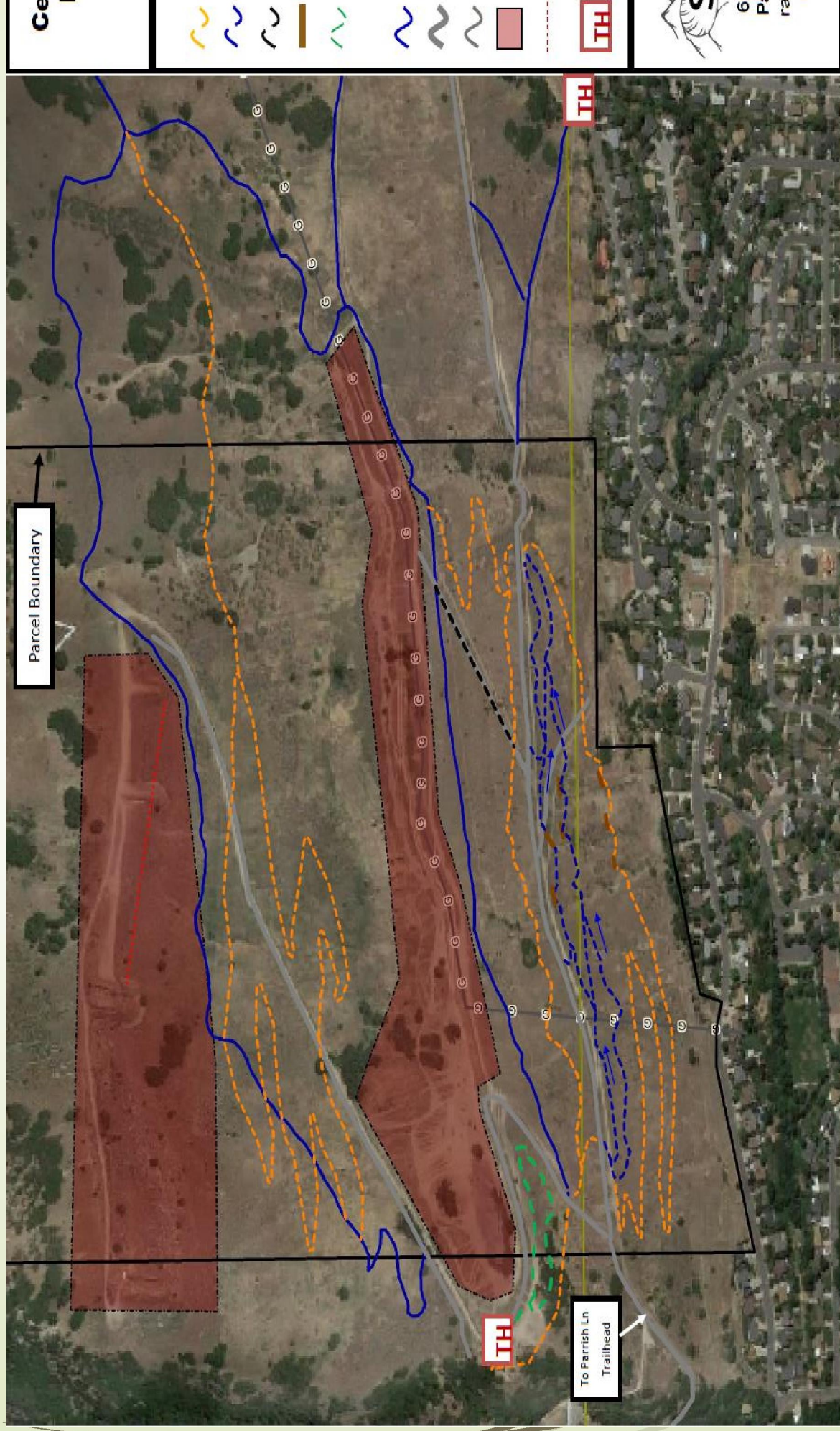


Impact Solutions to Hillside Trails

- **Centerville Gun Club-** trail designed to be lower
- **Erosion Control-** included in design
- **Hillside Drainage-** included in design
- **Grade of future trails-**included in design
- **Proximity to Homes-** design to be out of eyesight
- **Liability-** inherent risk with any outdoor activity
- **Trailhead access-** Duel Creek, Parrish Ln, Cheese Park
- **Parking-** No Parking Signs near or in adjacent neighbor hoods (Hill Side Parking Only) – Ride from home😊
- **Traffic-** all access points currently used daily
- **Visual impact from below-** designed to not be in eyesight
- **Dust Control-** Foot traffic (zero dust) Bike traffic 3"-4" on a very dry day
- **Utilities (restrooms, water)-** not there now for current hill side users. Non-issue

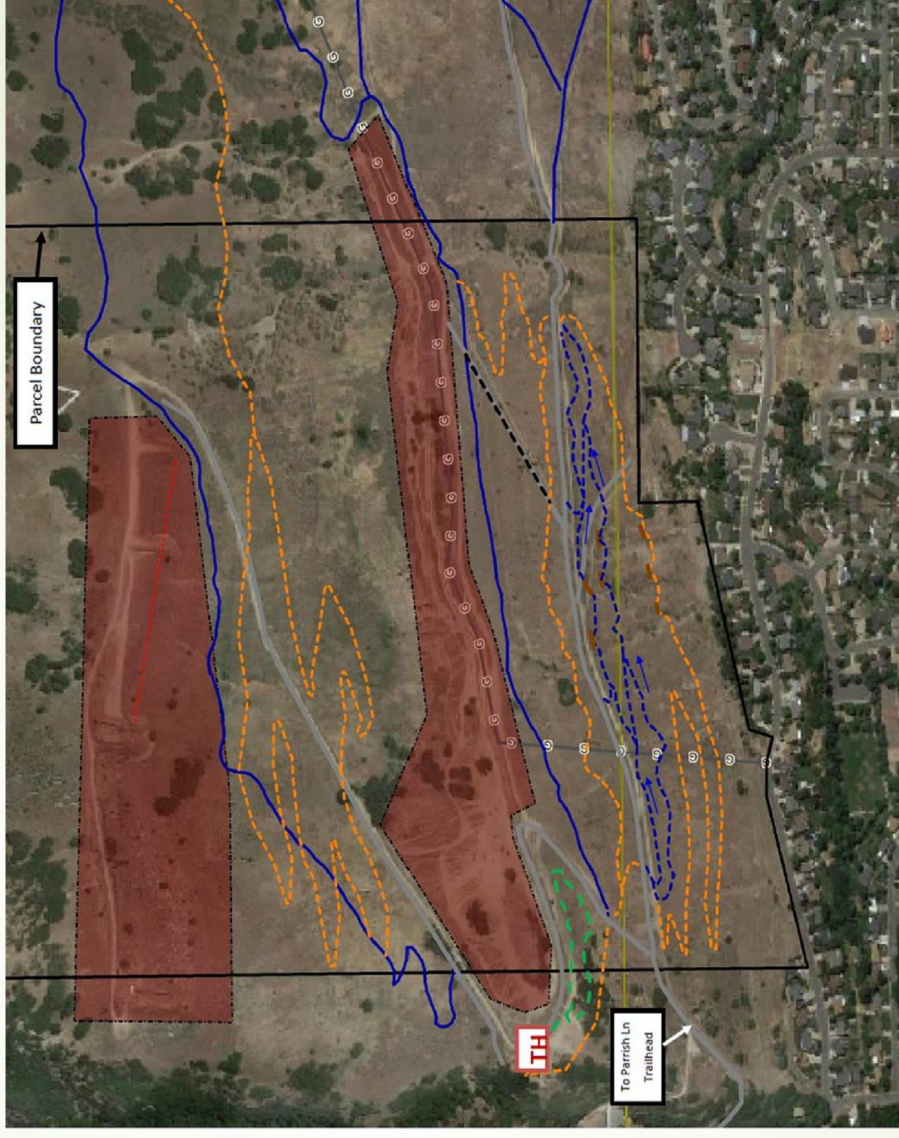

NATIONAL DAY OF SERVICE ON SEPTEMBER 11, 2021

September 11, 2021 has been designated as a National Day of Service and Remembrance to commemorate the 20th anniversary of the September 11th terrorist attacks. The Committee discussed various service projects for the trails in Centerville that need to be completed. Al Phelps said he has trail work planned for September 2nd. Bruce Cox, Parks and Recreation Director, said people have called him asking for projects to do on this day. There is also the website Just Serve, that people can go to and sign up for service projects. There is graffiti on the walls in the Legacy Trail Tunnel under the Legacy Highway that needs to be removed. The Rockwood Trail is in bad shape, and needs to be repaired, along with the Freedom Hills Trail. The south side of the Sunset and Wagon Wheel Trails need work done, and Mitzi and Bob Gray are willing to do more work on this trail, but the trees need to be trimmed back. Mitzi Gray and Al Ruesch will place flags on the trails where work needs to be done. Volunteers are required to bring their own tools.

The plans for what service projects the Trails Committee will do must be posted on the Just Serve Website by this Sunday. If there are enough volunteers, they will be sent to the Freedom Hills Trail to fill-in areas that have erosion from the recent rains. The Viewmont Mountain Bike Team could do a project on the Easy Cheesy Trial another time, as they have a team race on September 11th, and will not be able to help. Bob and Mitzi Gray will lead the service project on the Sunset Trail. Former Trails Committee member, Rick Turner, will be asked to lead a service team on the lower end of the Sunset Trail.

1 Mitzi Gray said there were many people who talked with Trail Committee members after
2 the Meet the Candidates Night at Smith Park a few weeks ago before the primary election. There
3 will be another Meet the Candidates for the general election, and Trail Committee members should
4 attend to bring awareness to the trails in Centerville. Jamison Pexton said sometimes people do
5 not understand mountain bikers, and they have the wrong perception of bikers. The Trails
6 Committee discussed having an activity that people could meet the Viewmont Mountain Bike
7 Team. The TREK Bike Store Manager could be asked to attend a City Council meeting to talk
8 about biking and how biking is for all ages.

10 **OPEN SPACE INITIATIVE – HILLSIDE DOCUMENT DISCUSSION**

12 Mitzi Gray distributed recommendations for General Plan Amendments/Open Spaces
13 Initiative, and she gave a presentation on the proposed amendments. She will also give this
14 presentation to the City Council and Planning Commission. Bruce Cox, Parks and Recreation
15 Director, said a couple of years ago, the City hired an intern from Utah State University, who made
16 a Parks Master Plan, which has not been approved yet, but it will include a trails plan. The purpose
17 of the Open Space Initiative is to acquire easements so homes cannot be built in areas where there
18 could be trails. Mitzi will contact Jennifer Hansen to get a copy of the Parks Master Plan. Bruce
19 Cox explained Centerville partnered with Bountiful to do an Active Transportation Plan within the
20 cities, but it also referenced bike trails. It is not known if Centerville adopted the proposed plan.
21 Cory Snyder, City Planner, wrote the Hillside Master Plan in order to get the City Council to make
22 goals for the area under the “V” on the mountain. Citizens were surveyed to see what uses they
23 would like to see on the mountain, but then the plan ended because of COVID. Bryce King is a
24 new City employee who is responsible for social media and is the new recreation coordinator. He
25 will make the City website easier to use and find what you need. Mitzi said she will give trails
26 information to Bryce to put on the website for the Trails Committee.
